Pat Fry presented the Molly Pitcher Medal:

Pat Fry, wife of Dewey Fry, was presented the Molly Pitcher Medal by Dennis Nelson, Kansas Society President, on behalf of the National Society, at their Annual Conference on March 24 in Junction City.

The Medal must be personally authorized by the National Color Guard Commander.

To qualify for the Molly Pitcher Medal, the woman's husband must have earned the Silver Color Guard Medal and have earned a minimum of 300 points at State, District and National events

in active support of her Color Guard husband. Chapter events are not included in the point count in spite of the work expended for them.

The only State level event currently recognized by the National Color Guard Commander for this medal is the Annual Conference.

One cannot merely accompany their Color Guard husband to an event to earn points. They must have made a contribution to supporting of the Color Guard. Pat has helped to assemble and disassemble wooden flag poles at a few hundred meetings, programs, parades, and naturalization ceremonies over the years supporting Dewey and other Color Guardsmen. She has provided water at the end of parades, sewn bags for storing and transporting flags and flag stands, made shoe buckles to slide on Color Guardsmen shoes, driven a truck pulling a flatbed trailer made into a float in Parades in Ottawa and Overland Park, and taken photos of Color Guardsmen and others on numerous occasions. The vast majority of this work is not recognized toward the Molly Pitcher Medal. The Molly Pitcher Medal has rarely been presented to a woman in Kansas as there are so few National events in Kansas and the opportunities to contribute at the events in other states are few.

Pat is looking forward to other ladies from Kansas being awarded the Molly Pitcher Medal.

The Kansas School for the Deaf is located in Olathe; it has a significant history having been established March 5, 1862.”
