### **The President's Corner**

Honor.

Alexander Hamilton engaged in a duel to defend his "honor." Our Patriot Ancestors (at least those signatories on the Declaration of Independence and, perhaps, many others) pledged themselves to support the Declaration with their lives, fortunes and their "sacred honor." So it must be something quite valuable.

But what really is "honor" and what does it mean? For some young folks its their reputation, or their "rep" for short. And here's another interesting thing about "honor." It can only be awarded to you. It's not really something that comes from a vending machine or which can be easily acquired or purchased. Others must confer honor upon us. While we can so conduct ourselves that we can have honor bestowed on us (recalling that Marc Anthony's soliloquy that "...and Brutus is an honorable man"), but it can also be lost, forfeited by living in a slovenly or reckless manner. Shakespeare described it thusly:

Good name in man or woman is the most perfect jewel of their lives. Who steals my purse steals trash; 'twas something, nothing, 'twas mine, 'tis his, and has been slave to thousands. But he who filches from me my good name takes from me that which not enriches him, and makes me poor indeed.

Sadly, when the media so conducts its inquiries in a manner that defames someone, that person often has been heard to inquire: "Where do I go to get my honor back?" Fortunately, our Patriot Ancestors were not worried about this. We bestow "honor" on our Patriot Ancestors, often because of their courage and devotion to the cause of our independence, but sometimes just because they were in the right place at the right time and simply had the courage to stand for the right, or had a thought about how posterity would regard them. Boy Scouts start their oath with the words: "On My Honor." We ask them to be true to that pledge, such that if a young man raises his hand and commits to something On His Honor we often drop further inquiries of him into the subject and accept his statement.

Our Patriot Ancestors certainly deserve the honor that we accord to them, but we may not think of the honor that they have bestowed on us. Our Recessional refers to "a nation of free men." How often do we think about the incredible gift of freedom that they have bestowed ("honored") on us? We should recognize that this is honor that we have NOT earned, but has been given to us. We should treasure and protect the honor that we have NOT earned for ourselves as a result of our ancestors' dedication to the principles of liberty and freedom that are enshrined in our founding documents.

# <u>Preview of Program for March 18 meeting (Reported by Matt Brady):</u>

On Saturday, March 18, 2017, The Zane Sisters, Kristen (Yarónya?awi? = Voice that Floats from the Sky) and Holly (Wakoresatáhta? = She Who Extends Her Paw), enrolled members of the Wyandot Nation of Kansas (bear clan), will share cultural and historical information and

artifacts about their tribe, and will speak about their tribes' (as well as neighboring tribes in Ohio's) and the frontier Zane family's involvement in the American Revolutionary War.

- Kristen Zane, PE, graduated from KU with a degree in Civil Engineering and has taken Federal Indian Law classes from UCLA. Although Kristen is now retired, she spent her entire Engineering career in the KC area and was the first minority and second woman President of the Kansas City Engineer Club. Kristen is currently working on a grant funded project with other retired tribal members to data archive all Wyandot records throughout the US and Canada and has previously served as Secretary of the tribal council.
- Holly Zane, JD, graduate from KU with degrees in Honors English and Law, has represented her tribe pro bono in federal litigation to preserve and protect its burial ground in Kansas City, Kansas, the Huron Indian Cemetery and has served in various roles on the tribal council. Holly has worked over the last decade as a Human Resources Professional for the State of Kansas.
