
The Thirty Third Annual George Washington Birthday Celebration (GWBC):

The GWBC was held February 23, 2019 at Embassy Suites KCI, 7640 Tiffany Springs Parkway, KCMO. Keil Hileman, of Monticello Trails Middle School (history teacher) was the guest speaker. Mr. Hileman was the state of Kansas, teacher of the year in 2004, and a finalist at the national level that same year. He also holds many other awards. Our Forefathers Flags



9 The Moultrie Flag

Most of the flags we have studied so far had their roots in battles fought in the northern colonies. This month's flag is the Moultrie Flag, which was the first American Flag flown in the south.

Charleston, South Carolina has two islands at the mouth of their harbor. The north island is called Sullivan Island, and the south island is called James Island. In 1775, James Island had a fort called Fort Johnson located on it, that was occupied by the British.

The South Carolina Safety committee was concerned about the British presence at the fort, and the fact that the British were freely sailing into and out of the Charleston Harbor. They tasked Colonel William Moultrie to take Fort Johnson from the British so the Americans could control the Harbor. Prior to launching his attack, since there was no official US Flag, Moultrie commissioned a flag with blue field and a white

crescent in the upper left corner. (The crescent is actually a gorget, which is a piece of armor worn to protect the neck. Some of our color guard wear gorget's as part of our uniforms.) There is some discussion among historians about whether the gorget on the flag has "Liberty" on it or not. Moultrie's own description of the flag did not contain the addition of Liberty to the gorget.

Now back to the story. In 1775, Moultrie's men successfully captured Fort Johnson with minimal resistance. From 1775 to 1776, to further strengthen the harbor defenses, South Carolina built a fort on Sullivan Island and called it Fort Sullivan. In 1776, one week before the signing of the Declaration of Independence, Fort Sullivan was attacked by the British, with the Moultrie Flag snapping in the breeze above the fort. The fort was constructed using sand and the local Palmetto Palm, which allowed it to absorb a brutal day of bombardment by the British, and still remain standing. Because of this protection, the American cannon were able to inflict damage on just about every British ship. The victory was decisive and along with swaying the local public opinion to the patriots, kept the British out of the south for three years.

Post battle, Fort Sullivan was renamed Fort Moultrie, and the flag became the flag of the South Carolina militia. The flag with the addition of a Palmetto palm became the state flag of South Carolina.
