2025 Americanism Report

In the Americanism contest, DX reported 21,011 points compared to 19,582 for 2024. In the President General Streamer contest, DX reported 7,190 points compared to 6,780 points for 2024. Combined totals were 28,201 points for 2025 compared to 26,362 for 2024. Points can only be claimed for primary members of the chapter.


Some highlights from the report are as follows:

- \$2,360 awarded to youth contestants from Kesler Youth Endowment Fund earnings
- 144 medals/certificates awarded to youth
- \$12,486 in donations to NSSAR charitable funds by members
- 92 programs presented by chapter members
- 38 certificates/medals were presented to non-SAR members
- 6 new members, 0 reinstatements and 7 supplementals
- State, district and national meetings attendance – 35
- 120 media references from Non-SAR sources
- 45 NSSAR in person or zoom committee meetings attended by official members
- Color guard attendance at events -266 including 9 parades, 9 Naturalizations, and 10 Honor Flight Receptions.

- Two members attended or participated in 50 patriot grave markings

Congratulations to all chapter members for their efforts whether it is active participation in the chapter, participation in the color guard and/or providing financial support through dues and donations.

The winners of the 2025 contests will be announced at SAR Congress in July and the release of individual chapter results in the fall of 2026..

Delaware Crossing Chapter Elementary School Poster Contest at Pioneer Ridge Middle School.

Certificates of Patriotism were made to be distributed to 128 Fifth-Grade students by their teachers in their Home Room classrooms following the Program and treats on Friday February 27.

A printed booklet containing the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, for each student, was given to Mrs. Haywood to distribute to each Home Room teacher then to each student. The Fifth-Grade teachers selected the best 18 posters from those made by the students. Those 18

were judged on Thursday morning February 26, by Larry Tatum, Clay Shropshire and Dan Dryer with assistance from Dewey Fry. The top 3 were determined which were announced at the Program on Friday.

This year the students gathered in the auditorium before the start of classes. This was the first time in 10 years of the Poster Contest at PRMS this was done. It required the Color Guard to Advance the Colors prior to the Announcements made over the PA system which ends with the reciting of our Pledge of Allegiance.

Michael Warren was the MC for the program, During the first few minutes of the program the Principal, Mr. Josh Kindler and Assistant Principal, Mr. Ryan Colston were thanked for their continuing support of the SAR Poster Contest.

Larry Tatum, Clay Shropshire, Dan Dryer and Dewey Fry participated in their Color Guard Uniforms. They stretched out each of 8 Colonial flags and the 250th Anniversary of the US Flag of the SAR as each was described by Michael Warren.

Dewey Fry gave a brief description of his uniform representative of the of George Washington; demonstrated the cutting of 5-pointed star with one cut of the scissors as Betsy Ross had done when making what many believe to be the first Flag of the United States; and described the loading and firing of a Brown Bess Musket using a 210–215-year-old 3rd Edition Brown Bess Musket.

At the program each of the 6 fifth-grade home room teachers and the fifth-grade IR teachers were presented Certificates of Commendation for encouraging and guiding the student in making the posters. Each teacher was also presented 2 US 250th Anniversary lapel pins for their personal use and a framed print of the Bill of Rights for their classroom. The prints of the Bill of Rights were printed in 1964.

The Third Place Poster, “Crossing the Delaware” was announced and the student artist asked come

stand by it on the stage. The Second Place Poster, "The Battle of Fort Washington" was announced and the student artist as to come stand by it. Then, the First Place Poster, "Daily News" was announced and at student artist asked to come stand by it. The students in the auditorium gave each a rousing applause.

After the program in the auditorium, the students proceeded to the cafeteria to enjoy cupcakes that had been arranged to depict a US Flag and juice boxes were provided for each student and teacher plus a few more.

The winning posters were displayed and the students that made them were asked to stand by them. The students were presented with the certificates for 1st through 3rd places at Pioneer Ridge Middle School. For the first time, Mr. Kindler attended and was presented a Certificate of Commendation and a 250th Anniversary of the USA lapel pin. Dewey Fry went to office to present the same type of certificate and pin to Mr. Colston, he met Mr. Colston and presented them to him. Then Mr. Colston was on his way to attend the gathering in the cafeteria. On the way out of the office, Mr. Colston and Dewey met Dr. Brian Huff, the Superintendent of the Gardner-Edgerton School District. Those 3 administrators expressed that they thoroughly enjoyed the event in the cafeteria. It was learned later Mr. Kindler also looked in on some of the program in the auditorium.

Dewey had left the 3 winning posters at the school office so that they would be available for the program in case something happened to him. He found out that much of the office staff including the Principal had looked at them. Suspecting this would happen Dewey never indicated which was 1st, 2nd and 3rd. When the receptionist saw the order of finish, she said that it was the order they had chosen. That must mean we did a pretty good job of judging.


After the students went to their classrooms, Dewey Fry went the auditorium to get something

When they saw Dewey, they all started waving and saying HI! The effect of this Poster Contest at Pioneer Ridge Middle School lasts for many years in the student's mind.


Dewey has been recognized by many students at the high school level and beyond and they have expressed what the learned from it and how much they enjoyed it.


