Our Chapter's name,
Is rich in historical lore,

Lawrence on a cruise.

So, our chapter founded here in 1960,
Has a name with quite a story,
Of the Revolutionary War,
And the Kansas Territory.

Your Color Guard at Work

During the month of December 2025 your Delaware Crossing Color Guardsmen participated in a few events.

On December 11, Bruce Smith (far left), Dewey Fry (center behind award with eagle), Kirk Rush (to Dewey's left) and Clay Shropshire (to Kirk's left) participated in the annual Henry Leavenworth Chapter annual Muster as part of the KSSAR Color Guard. Also participating were DX dual members Alan Martin and Jeffrey Winters. The muster is a program in which the thirteen original colonies and the country of France is presented and all attendees who have a patriot ancestor from that colony may name one of their patriot ancestors from that colony or country by citing their name and service.

Also intermittently during the program, awards are presented to persons of the community, DAR and SAR. Dewey Fry was a recipient of two of the awards.

On December 12 Color Guardsmen presented, posted and retired the colors at the Delaware Crossing Holiday Meeting.

On December 13, Delaware Crossing Color Guardsmen participated in the KSSAR Color Guard at the Wreaths Across America Ceremony at Johnson County Community Garden Cemetery. Participants were, from left to right in the photo of the color guardsmen holding the flags, Dewey Fry with the US Flag, Steven French with the Betsy Ross Flag, Clay Shropshire with the SAR Flag, Kirk Rush with the Bunker Hill Flag, Kenneth Ludwig with the Sons of Liberty Flag, and Dan Dryer with the SAR 250th Anniversary of the USA Flag. The Color Guard presented the colors and during the ceremony placed each wreath on the stands for the USA Armed Forces of the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Forces, Space Force, Coast Guard, and POW/MIA. After retiring the colors, the Color Guard ceremonially placed wreaths on graves of veterans before the general public placed them on many other graves of veterans.

On December 16th, the Delaware Crossing Chapter Color Guardsmen participated in a Naturalization Ceremony at the Robert J. Dole US Courthouse in KCK. 72 applicants took their Oath of Allegiance during the ceremony and one late arrival was administered her Oath of Allegiance after the ceremony. This is the first after ceremony administering of the Oath observed by the Color Guardsmen in the 15 years of Color Guard participation. That applicant was grateful to become a US citizen even if it occurred after the ceremony.
