### The President's Corner

A Prayer for America.

"O beautiful, for heroes proved; In liberating strife. Who more than self their country loved, and mercy more than life! America! America! May God thy gold refine, till all success be nobleness and every gain divine!

O beautiful, for patriot dream, that sees beyond the years, thine alabaster cities gleam undimmed by human tears! America! America! God shed his grace on thee, till nobler men keep once again thy whiter jubilee!"

It is said that Katharine Lee Bates composed this poem while she was standing atop Pike's Peak, surveying the expanse before her.

On this Memorial Day weekend, we are challenged to remember not only our forefather-patriots about whom the verse quoted above sings. But we must remember their sacrifice and constancy, but the principles they struggled so valiantly to establish.

A few years ago, while on a business trip to Washington, I found time to visit the then newly-

constructed World War II memorial. Our chapter has, at least once, recognized the declining number of "Honor Flights" that take WWII veterans to visit this memorial. My visit was not that dignified, but I was still deeply impressed as I moved toward the rear of the memorial and paused there before a wall of some 400 gold stars behind a reflecting pool. When I came to realize that each of those stars represented 1,000 members of our armed forces who had given their lives simply to permit me to stand there, I was moved to tears. I left with a resolve to do what little I could to preserve the principles that our Patriot Ancestors held so dear that they would resist and defeat the most formidable power that the world then knew.

Today, resistance has become a key word. "Resist," the cry is heard. But Resist what? Surely not those same principles for which our ancestors stood so tall. Surely not those same principles for those who were and have been memorialized? Surely not those principles held by those who now rest in the hallowed ground of Arlington, or those principles for which some 50,000 died in Vietnam? No, I say defiantly: Those principles live on because of the sacrifice made. And we — we — must now grasp the torch that has been handed to us.

We must continue with renewed strength our objective to educate those younger than ourselves about those principles and why they matter. Liberty. Self-government. And Freedom.

When prose fails, one can turn to poetry. Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, who fought in 1918 on the Western Front in World War I, penned these closing words before he, too, gave the last full measure of devotion:

We are the Dead. Short days ago, we lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, loved and were loved and now we lie in Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; to you from failing hands we throw the torch; be yours to hold it high. If you break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep, though poppies grow

In Flanders Fields.

It is now our responsibility to hold that torch of principles high, but only for a little while and then we, too, must hand it to others if it is to survive and stay lit. We must teach the young, one by one, those same principles that were so dear to our Patriot Ancestors, to Col. McCrae, and to thousands upon thousands who have given the last full measure of devotion to keep that flame alight.

Remember. Always remember.
